After the stories we were taken for a tour around the museum where we viewed photos and models from this period of the War. We then lit a candle of remembrance for all those who suffered in the Holocaust.

We tried various foods which had been prepared for us, such as kangaroo meat, boar meat and egg-plant and spinach dips.
