CANOPIC JARS AND VITAL ORGANS

Through the creation of storyboards in Year 7 Humanities, student entered the world of the burial process in Ancient Egypt.

They documented the sequence of organ removal and body preparation for mummification which ensured that the body was in a fit state for the afterlife.

In Art, students created their own canopic jars, once used for organ storage. They also finessed their linocut skills to produce prints of their names, translated into hieroglyphics. Students used all of this knowledge to prepare research reports for English. This week, their studies culminated in oral presen-

tations of their comparative studies of modern Australian society and Ancient Egypt, considering topics such as building, government, religion and roles of women.
